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

First place: SUSAN KAZLOW FRIEDLAND of Alpharetta / in San Francisco

Friedland, an artist accompanied her husband on a business trip last spring. Out for her morning walk and carrying her Canon Rebel 200 EOS, she spied this enormous billboard for Five Brothers pasta sauces. She titled it "You Say Tomato." Judge Corinne Adams called it "bold and energetic like the city. It's almost 3-D." Judge Susan Todd-Raque liked the "contrast between the old and new. This sign is so contemporary and powerful, very sleek, against a building obviously from the turn of the century."
